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





The Mental Health Royal Commission as a game changer



- The Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System highlights the need for key reforms, including a focus on families and carers.
- Chapter 19 of Volume 3 of the Royal Commission's final report provides a key recommendation for the creation of 8 family and carer-led centres
- To provide a holistic space in which families and carers can be supported across metropolitan Melbourne and regional Victoria with a wellbeing lens.



Key Changes

- Need for focus on families and carers
- Recognition of lived experience and peer support to inform service delivery
- A mosaic of hope



Creation of Family and Carer-led Centres

- Tandem, peak body for family, carers and supporters in Mental Health, commissioned to codesign the Family and Carer-led Centres
- Formation of Expert Advisory Group
- Extensive consultation around regional
 Victoria holding workshops with
 families, carers and supporters.





What will the Family & Carer-led Centres do?

- Each have a physical location and an online presence
- Provide information about supports and services available in each region
- Connect families, carers and supporters with the right support as available
- Offer after-hours access in some form
- Provide families, carers, friends, and supporters with access to funds to help with immediate practical needs
- Support older carers with transition planning
- Help families and carers to navigate the Mental Health and Wellbeing system and other supports
- Support volunteer-based family and carer peer support groups in each region





The future is bright with opportunities!

- Families, carers and supporters are better resourced
- The recognition of lived experience and peer support as an intrinsic means of support, advocacy and service design
- Recognition of the support and role families provide, and that they have their own unique needs



Challenges

- Not creating inadvertent silos for families to navigate
- Need for funding to embed family inclusive practice in AOD and MH services
- Reaching culturally and linguistically diverse groups, and engaging lived experience



The golden seam

- Kintsugi is the Japanese art of putting broken pottery pieces back together with gold — built on the idea that in embracing flaws and imperfections, you can create an even stronger, more beautiful piece of art.
