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



- June 2013: Consumer law re: more individual chemicals


State:







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Wastewater drug monitoring: Never let the evidence get in the way of a good story

Methamphetamine is back at the forefront of national attention, thanks to the framing of new wastewater analysis data as further evidence of a national 'ice epidemic'. The reality, of course, is more complex. On the 26th of March the Australian Criminal Intelligence Centre (ACIC) disseminated media releases that were tailored to each state citing findings from the first National Wastewater Drug Monitoring Program report. These media releases led to the latest round of hyperbolic media coverage about illicit drug use in Australia, predominantly focused on methamphetamine.





Alcohol-related harm

- 26% of Australians report that they consumed alcohol consumption at levels that placed them at-risk of acute harm on a monthly basis!!
- accidents, assaults, domestic violence, MVA, Rx, employment issues, relationship problems (e.g., affair)
- 47% homicides in Australia between 2000 and 2006 were classified as alcohol-related
- 15.4% of people who try alcohol will develop dependence

Flakka the new 'Zombie Drug' taking over Australia

The latest drug to hit Australia sounds like 'slacker' but turns users into 'zombies'. - by Faye James





What is the drug 'flakka'?

As recently as June this year Alpha–PVP – known on the street as flakka – pronounced Flack–er (like slacker) – has been added to the poisons list in Australia. According to the TGA, Flakka has "significant stimulant and psychoactive effects ... [and] human use has resulted in death."

How do you take Flakka?

According to the NZ Drug Foundation, flakka can be smoked, inhaled, injected or swallowed, and can even be vaped using an e-cigarette. As harmless as vaping might sound, it allows the drug to enter the bloodstream really quickly making it "particularly easy to overdose" according to drugabuse.gov.



A disturbing new drug called "monkey dust", which is being passed off as ecstasy on dancefloors and at music festivals nationwide, has triggered a major health alert.

Authorities warn the cheap and potentially lethal drug, also known as bath salts or MDPV, can cause psychosis.

Its hallucinogenic effects are so strong, some users believe they are superhuman and jump off buildings or in front of cars, or bang their heads into walls.
