Screening + Identification: Suitable for all professionals who may identify family violence is occurring and who engage with people in a one-off, episodic or ongoing service environment and are in a position to identify or screen for family violence. If your work has a greater level of family violence response, please choose Brief and Intermediate.

Learning objectives:

- Understand how to engage effectively with clients accessing services who may have experienced family violence.
- Identify family violence risk utilising the MARAM Framework and Screening and Identification tool.
- Prioritise the safety of victim survivors of family violence (including child victim survivors)
- Understand risk management responsibilities at the Screening and Identification level under the MARAM Framework and collaborate with specialist services and practitioners who are aligned to the Brief and Intermediate level of MARAM.

Advanced MARAM Training

Prerequisites: The following trainings are tailored for clinicians who have completed the Brief/Intermediate training, and are designed to be supplementary. Please note: these trainings do not replace the mandatory MARAM victim survivor and adult person using violence (TBA) training.

MARAM Family Violence Against Older People (Elder Abuse)

Provided by: DFFH

Delivery mode: eLearn Modules; 3x modules approx. 20 minutes to complete

Learning objectives:

- Understanding Family Violence
- Understanding Elder Abuse
- Your MARAM practice responsibilities and role in responding to family violence, including safety planning

The aim of this eLearn course is to tailor the screening and identification MARAM level of responsibility specifically to the aged care workforce, to strengthen their response to family violence elder abuse risk.

Putting MARAM into Practice: Techniques to maintain a therapeutic relationship in a Family Violence Setting

- Techniques to keep V/S engaged with a service if FV questions risk disengagement
- Common practice frameworks will be examined to identify where assessment and management of FV should influence therapeutic work
- Keep engagement if perpetrator wants to accompany V/S or tries to restrict her engagement
- This will be a practice-oriented workshop which will work with several complex case studies
- Techniques to manage risk and keep engagement when contact with the V/S is not regular
