



Actions taken by perpetrator to harm child


Full spectrum of the non-offending parent's efforts to promote the wellbeing of the child Adverse impact of the perpetrator's behavior on the child



Working at the intersection of AOD/MH/FV



- Intersection AOD/MH/FV
- Majority of our clients are male
- Women parents (gendered nature of parenting)
- Forensic clients
- Understanding of substance use coercion
- Shared clients with Child Protection
- Collaborative working relationships with MH/justice/CP/family services/ FV services/MBC


Giving AOD Services a Voice



- AOD service presence and voice is crucial
- We work with both perpetrators & victim survivors
- The business of AOD is behaviour change
- Advocacy a key part of our work
- Using S&T to break down barriers with other sectors who think we are not capable of/ should not be addressing FV with FV survivors/perpetrators

Embedding in Action



- Utilising case formulation and clinical review to explore risk, safety and protective factors
- Collaborative communication to all professionals engaged with families, including organising care team & professionals' meetings to increase cohesive understanding of risk and protective factors
- Documentation applying a family violence to case notes, support letters, reports etc
- FVISS & CISS in action —in the past we were only asked, now we can ask.




- Engage! In training, conversations, curiosity, FVISS, CISS, MARAM and with your local Specialist AOD FV Advisor.

- Resist! Collusion with persons using violence and identify the strength and resistance of Victim Survivors.
