**Prerequisites:** The following trainings are tailored for clinicians who have completed the Brief/Intermediate training, and are designed to be supplementary. Please note: these trainings do not replace the mandatory MARAM victim survivor and adult person using violence (TBA) training.

### MARAM Family Violence Against Older People (Elder Abuse)

Provided by: DFFH

**Delivery mode:** eLearn Modules; 3x modules approx. 20 minutes to complete

#### Learning objectives:

- Understanding Family Violence
- Understanding Elder Abuse
- Your MARAM practice responsibilities and role in responding to family violence, including safety planning

The aim of this eLearn course is to tailor the screening and identification MARAM level of responsibility specifically to the aged care workforce, to strengthen their response to family violence elder abuse risk.
